




There are many sights and ruins such as Bergama (Pergamon)





They love to spend time outside, so they visit cafes and bars.












The name of our School is Mimar Sinan Ortaokulu.

The students are generally from immigrant families, which came to Izmir in last 20 years.

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We have orientation classes for them to adapt well in Turkey. Here a teacher is teaching them to read and write in Turkish.

We have 10 classrooms, and we share the school garden with a primary school.

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Our lessons last 40 minutes and we get 7 lessons for a day. If students want to get supporting classes, they can come to school on weekends as well.
